

Caste and Politics in contemporary India

The marginalised section saw it as opportunity to be part of mainstream. The anti reservation lobby were supported by the capitalist with the support of administrators and media.

Similarly, in Bihar's implementation of MUNGER LAL COMMISSION report by Karpoori Thakur government in 1978 resulted in agitation against and for reservation.
