Topic :- concept of tribal politics in brief

Tribal Politics refers to the political activities, movements, and issues concerning indigenous or tribal communities within a state. In India, tribal politics focuses on the rights, representation, and development of **Scheduled Tribes (STs)** as recognized by the Constitution.
